Moore and her husband live in Iola with their two rescue dogs. When she is not serving CAP, Moore volunteers for ThedaCare Hospice, Iola Lioness, Hitterdahl Church and Waupaca County Suicide Prevention Coalition.

WHAT IS THE GREATEST NEED?

CAP Services' Community Needs Assessment results

CAP conducted its triennial needs assessment in 2019 to identify local needs and develop strategic goals for programming over the next three years. Paper surveys were mailed to low-income households in CAP's five-county service area (Marquette, Outagamie, Portage, Waupaca, and Waushara). Surveys were also available in both English and Spanish at CAP offices and community partner locations. Focus groups were conducted in two locations: for residents in rural Marquette County and for Hmong residents in Portage County. CAP staff and community partners received online surveys. All survey results were entered into a database for data collection and analysis. Both quantitative and qualitative data were collected as part of the needs assessment.

Key findings identified that residents in CAP's service area are struggling to make ends meet. The top five priority areas identified by the needs assessment were: not enough money to pay all bills; need better paying job; not enough money to respond to unexpected emergencies; need safe, affordable housing; and need full-time, year-round job. Due to limited finances, families may not be able to absorb expenses above and beyond their limited budget. One adverse incident can put them at risk. For example, inability to pay for car repairs can impact an individual's ability to get to work. A sudden loss of income due to a plant shutdown can put a family's housing at risk. Inability to pay a short-term medical expense can impact an individual's long-term health.

Key strategies for addressing the needs include increasing economic stability, advancing education and employment opportunities, and providing access to safe and affordable housing. CAP offers a variety of programs as strategies to address these needs, including the Skills Enhancement Program, Volunteer Income Tax Assistance, and rental housing. In 2019, CAP started a new initiative called, "Small Loans, Big Difference" to help people access affordable loan services that can build credit and/or provide debt consolidation. Small loans are a good way for individuals to build credit, avoid predatory lending products, and increase their financial stability and quality of life. CAP offers this program to residents in three of the five counties in our service area, with hopes to expand to all five counties.

Staff will continue to analyze the results of this assessment and explore new opportunities to accomplish CAP's vision that individuals and families have the capacity to achieve their goals and thrive in resilient, equitable communities.

Completer of the Skills Enhancement Program

We are excited to have reached a milestone of 1,000 graduates from the Skills Enhancement Program in 2019. Linsey, who graduated in October, was officially recorded as the 1,000th graduate. Her story exemplifies the success we strive for all our participants to experience. Linsey is a single mother who was working, but struggling to make her family's budget balance each month. She knew that going back to school would be the best way to ensure her financial security through a higher paying job.



Linsey didn't know how she would be able to afford the costs associated with going back to school until she learned about the Skills Enhancement Program. The Program was able to provide financial assistance as well as encouragement, guidance and support while she balanced school, work and family. All her hard work paid off with a degree earned in the Surgical Technologist program at NWTC. She now has the skills and credentials she needs to work in her chosen field. She has started the next chapter of her life working in a hospital that provides her full-time hours, benefits provided by her employer, and an increase in her wage of \$11.92 per hour

2020 CENSUS

What you need to know and what CAP is doing to assist

The census asks questions that provide a snapshot of our nation. Census results affect your voice in government, how much funding your community receives, and how your community plans for the future. Nearly every household will receive an invitation to participate in the 2020 Census from either a postal worker or a census worker. Your responses to the 2020 Census are safe, secure and protected by federal law.

When you fill out the census you help:

- Determine how many seats your state gets in Congress
- Guide how more that \$675 billion in federal funding is distributed to states and communities each year
- Create jobs, provide housing, prepare for emergencies, and build schools, roads and hospitals

CAP's Hmong UPLIFT Coordinator, Phong Vang is serving on the Portage County Complete Count Committee and we have hired a Census Specialist to lead CAP's efforts to engage and increase participation by hard to count communities for the 2020 census.
