Head Start & Early Head Start Annual Report 2023

What is Head Start?

CAP Services' Head Start and Early Head Start are federaland state-funded programs that promote school readiness and provide quality health, nutritional, social, and other services to enrolled children and families. The chart highlights examples of services provided. These comprehensive programs involve the family and community in which they live to support the total development of the child.

Head Start and Early Head Start services are provided in Portage, Waupaca, Waushara, and Marquette counties. Head Start is a part year program for children ages 3-5 years. Early Head Start is a full year program serving pregnant women and children ages 0-3.

Income-eligible families with children ages zero-to-five, pregnant women, and families with children with documented disabilities are encouraged to apply anytime.

2022-2023 Overview

This program year was the end of the second year of the program's five-year grant cycle. For the five-year period, one of the goal's actions focuses on enrollment. As the program data was reviewed, a decision was made to reduce the Head Start enrollment capacity from 280 to 232 children. The Office of Head Start approved this enrollment reduction in June 2023.

Another program goal centers on the staff experience to promote supportive work experiences. As staff continued to express concerns about the number of



children with concerning and challenging behavior, quality improvement funds were used to add an additional Special Services Manager position resulting in having three Special Services Managers to provide staff with support and strategies to use when working with children and families across all seven sites. The Conscious Discipline program continued with the creation of a Conscious Discipline Action Team (CDAT) to provide leadership with the implementation process.

The program's remaining American Rescue Plan funds were utilized to provide monetary retention incentives on a monthly

retention incentives on a monthly basis to all Head Start and Early Head Start staff through March 2023.



Education

The program utilizes Teaching Strategies Creative Curriculum as the foundation for lesson planning in the center-based option. Children are guided through a variety of Studies (i.e., music making, boxes, roads, exercise, bread) while building development skills across all areas. The curriculum further includes a platform to connect parents with their child's learning in the classroom.

In the home-based option, Parents as Teachers is the foundation in planning activities during home visits. As their child's primary teacher, parents utilize the expertise of home visitors in guiding their child's learning and development. In addition, the parenting curriculum is based on Conscious Discipline concepts to encourage primarily social and emotional development of children in both center and home-based options.



School Readiness Outcomes

Percentage of Children Meeting or Exceeding Age Expectations

Both program options assess children's school readiness skills with Teaching Strategies GOLD. The overall school readiness goals are for 90% of children to meet or exceed age expectations in the Head Start Early Learning Outcomes Framework domains of Approaches to Learning, Social-Emotional Development, Language and Communication, Cognition, and Perceptual, Physical, & Motor Development. In 2022-2023, the goal was met in two domains as indicated in the chart.

Parent, Family, Community Engagement

Parent, Family and Community Engagement is the foundation of our program. A child's most important life-long teacher and advocate is their parents. Parents and staff begin by developing trusting relationships so parents embrace and gain confidence and skills in all aspects of their parenting role. Staff work with community collaborators to support families in accessing the resources needed to be the most successful they can be. Ongoing and recent life challenges have not held back resilient staff, parents, and communities from experiencing positive outcomes. Parents are overcoming barriers, reaching goals, and pursuing dreams for themselves and their children.

95% of families agreed or strongly agreed they spend more quality time with their children reading, playing together, and building a stronger relationship since participating in the program.



2022 Audit Results

CAP Services financial audit meets the GAAP and Uniform Guidance requirements of its federal grant sources, including Head Start. CAP Services is considered a low-risk auditee and received an unmodified opinion on the consolidated financial statements of CAP Services, Inc and Subsidiaries for the year ended 12/31/2022. The auditors' associated report of compliance for the major federal and state awards also expressed an unmodified opinion. There were no audit findings relative to the major federal and state awards for CAP Services, Inc.

2023 Federal Monitoring Outcomes

In March 2023 the Administration for Children and Families Office of Head Start conducted a Focus Area 1 monitoring review of the CAP Services Early Childhood Development program and established that the program had no findings.

In February 2023, the Administration for Children and Families conducted a monitoring review. Based on the information gathered during the review, CAP Services Early Childhood Development was found to be out of compliance with one Head Start Program Performance Standard, 1302.90 Personnel policies, (c) Standards of conduct. (1) A program must ensure all staff, consultants, contractors, and volunteers abide by the program's standards of conduct. A Corrective Action Plan was completed.
